Pre-Reading (read the biography of Stephen Crane on pg. 433):

- 1. When did Stephen Crane live? Is "A Mystery of Heroism" a primary source account of a Civil War battle?
- 2. What kinds of stories is Crane interested in? (Hint: Naturalism)
- 3. **Prediction:** Based on Crane's biography and the title, what do you think "A Mystery of Heroism" will be about?

Reading Questions

- 4. (Pgs. 435-436) How does Crane describe the battle taking place in this story?
- 5. (Pgs. 437-438) What is Collins arguing about? What does he ask to do? What is strange or foolish about this?
- 6. (Pg. 439) What is unusual about how Collins feels stepping out into the battlefield?

- a. What does this cause him to conclude about heroes?
- 7. (Pg. 441) What heroic thing does Collins do as he runs back to safety?
- 8. (Pg. 441) What is ironic about the ending?

Post-Reading Questions

- 9. Do you think Crane considers Collins a hero? Explain why or why not.
- 10. Before the Civil War, many Americans viewed war as noble and patriotic. How might the Civil War have changed people's perception of war?

Creative Project (CHOOSE ONE OF THE FOLLOWING):

- **OPTION 1:** Imagine you are directing a film adaptation of "A Mystery of Heroism."
 - Create a movie poster for a film adaptation of the story
 - Come up with an 8-track soundtrack for your movie adaptation of the story. For each song, include a short paragraph (3-4 sentences) explaining exactly when the song will play and why it fits with the story.
- **OPTION 2:** Read the Civil War letters & journal entries on pgs. 446-449. Write 3 letters and/or journal entries from the perspective of a civil war soldier, each detailing a major event from the war. Should be based upon information covered in class and/or outside research (2 pg. minimum).
