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Unit 1: Pre-Columbian America & Colonization (12,000 BC-1600 AD)

Unit Overview:

This introductory unit establishes the context for American colonization and explores the origins of several themes that will pervade American History. The unit begins with the population of the Americas, then jumps ahead to the Age of Exploration and colonization by European empires. By highlighting the Reconquista as a key prerequisite for colonization, students will identify religion and racism as defining characteristics of colonization. In studying the structure of colonial empires, students will learn key economic concepts that will continue into upcoming units, such as mercantilism, imports/exports, and the Columbian Exchange.

Unit Objectives:

- SWBAT explain the causes and effects of the Age of Exploration IOT analyze and contextualize American colonization.
- SWBAT analyze a variety of primary and secondary sources
 - IOT explain the origins and diversity of human cultures in pre-Columbian America.

- SWBAT implement prewriting strategies and make use of writing resources IOT compose a strong piece of historical analysis.
